



Interim Superintendent's Proposed Recommendations

Forty-six percent of schools are currently outside of the target utilization defined in HCPSS Policy 6010. It took many years to get us to this point and will require a comprehensive approach and creative thinking to address overcrowding.

These recommended options represent innovative solutions that combine programmatic expansion with redistricting to reduce overcapacity and address feeder pattern inconsistencies. Through the acceleration of High School #13 to 2022, we will delay redistricting at the high school level, but provide some relief to overcrowded schools.

This solution moves us further down a path of ensuring that students' needs are met and they have equitable opportunities to thrive.



RECOMMENDATIONS AT A GLANCE

- **High** – No proposed redistricting at the high school level. Recommend expansion of dual enrollment options for approximately 350 students through JumpStart HCPSS.
- **Middle** – Limited redistricting of 313 students to address feeder patterns.
- **Elementary** – Redistrict 1,922 students to fill Elementary School #42 and bring 37 elementary schools below or within maximum capacity.

HIGH SCHOOLS

There will be no high school redistricting for 2018–19. The next high school redistricting process will begin during the 2020–21 school year to allow time to prepare for opening High School #13 in Fall 2022. The recommendations include expansion of dual enrollment options for high school students at our most congested high schools—Howard, Centennial and Long Reach—more than doubling the number of HCPSS students taking advantage of dual enrollment opportunities.

The JumpStart HCPSS initiative represents our commitment to programmatic improvements, through our partnership with Howard Community College, to increase dual enrollment opportunities and help students earn college credits while attending high school.

JumpStart HCPSS will help alleviate overcrowding at those three schools while expanding our programmatic priorities.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

The planned Fall 2018 opening of Elementary School #42 provides an opportunity to relieve elementary overcrowding in the eastern part of the county.

In addition to redistricting necessary to fill Elementary School #42, the recommendations would balance capacity utilization across elementary schools in the Columbia area. The recommendations also provide critical relief to Manor Woods Elementary School.

Over the long term, we will achieve further progress by opening Elementary School #43 in 2023, replacing Talbott Springs Elementary School, and through initiatives such as regional immersion centers for languages, performing arts or STEM.

MIDDLE SCHOOLS

The proposed redistricting for middle schools addresses a major concern of families of middle school students: inconsistent and broken feeder patterns that split neighborhoods and friends in high school. By moving approximately 300 students, we can adjust feeder patterns to align with elementary schools.

Over the longer term, we will achieve further progress through the redistricting related to the opening of High School #13, and through initiatives such as a planned middle/high school career development center.
